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


God's Servant first

"The Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life."

All Catholics respect and signify the importance and the epic role of the Holy Eucharist in creating and building a strong relationship between God and humankind.

FIFTEENTH WEEK OF ORDINARY TIME

THIS SUNDAY'S READINGS

Today we pray ...

O God, who show the light of your truth to those who go astray, so that they may return to the right path, give all who for the faith they profess are accounted Christians the grace to reject whatever is contrary to the name of Christ and to strive after all that does it honour..

FIRST READING ISAIAH 55:10-11

The word that goes out from my mouth does not return to me empty

God's word is never lacking, never ineffective; the variable is our response. Human freedom is the only reality that can hamper God's word, but even then, the word is not outdone.

SECOND READING ROMANS 8:18-23

The whole creation is eagerly waiting for God to reveal his sons

Paul mentions two types of suffering in this short reading: the sufferings that are an unavoidable part of normal life, and the 'groaning,' the restlessness and dissatisfaction that are the lot of the believer who knows that his or her heart will be restless until it rests in God.

GOSPEL MATTHEW 13:1-23

A sower went out to sow

The parable of the sower is the first full parable in Matthew's Gospel (and in Mk and Lk). It is the key to understanding all the others. Every parable is intended to elicit a response to God's word; in every instance, Christ the sower sows his word in the heart of the listener, who must choose whether or not to bear a harvest.

SEEING LIFE THROUGH THE LENS OF THE GOSPEL

- 1. Jesus uses parables to make people think about their own responses to his message. As you read this parable you may recognise that at different times you have been like each of the different types of soil. As you recall times when you presented fertile soil for the word of God, what helped you create that receptive atmosphere? What lessons for life do you get from that?
- 2. Parents with children, teachers with pupils, speakers with listeners, are all like sowers in a field where the preparation of the soil is up to another the child, pupil or listener. They can sow the seed but cannot guarantee it will bear fruit. At times there may be a temptation not to try any more. The challenge is to sow in hope. When have you been surprised by the harvest you have reaped?
- 3. 'We are wasting our time here' may sometimes be the apparent wisdom in a group. Have there been times when you have gone against this apparent wisdom and seen your efforts bear fruit?

THE CHURCH OF THE ANNUNCIATION AT NEW MILLS

Authority has now been granted to open The Annunciation New Mills for Public worship

Public Masses will take place,

Sundays 9-30 a.m. Wednesday 4-30 p.m. Fridays 11-30 a.m.

The church will be open 30 minutes before and after mass for quiet prayer and Because of limited capacity, and Government regulations, anyone wishing to attend Mass will have to pre-Book their place...

If people arrive without having pre-booked their place and the church is, or likely to be at capacity, unfortunately they will not be allowed in..

To book a place please ring 07561 699278, between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday to Friday, at least one day in advance of the service you wish to attend and one of our Parishioners will help.

Please be ready to give your name, contact details, and how many places needed -this is the only way places may be pre-booked

Services may only be booked 7 days in advance, and one service at a time. If the service you wish to attend is full (as is likely on Sundays), we will operate a priority list for following weeks

Please arrive at the service early, to allow time for the Stewards to show you to your allocated space. Social Distancing continues to operate in the Church, always keeping a distance of 2 Metres.

SUNDAY MASS OBLIGATION:

Please, if you are shielding, vulnerable or 'bubbling' with somebody in these categories, refrain from coming to church. It is important that you look after not only your own, but your family's health.

Our bishops have relaxed the rules of Sunday observance and have no intention of reintroducing the obligation to attend mass until such time as everybody can be safely accommodated in church.

OPENING FOR MASS AT MARPLE BRIDGE AND CHAPEL

Hopefully, as the rules for who may volunteer to be a steward have been relaxed a little, we shall be opening these churches in the very near future.

A BEAUTIFUL WAY TO START THE DAY:

During the course of this week, a parishioner sent me a prayer card. The prayer itself makes a beautiful Morning Offering and, if said daily, should help us change our ways of life and become the type of people Christ wants us to be.

Prayer of St Benedict of Nursia

Bestow upon me,
O gracious, O Holy Father
intellect to understand You,
perceptions to perceive You
purely,
reason to discern You,
diligence to see You,

wisdom to find You,
a spirit to know You,
a heart to meditate upon You,
ears to hear You,
eyes to behold You,
a tongue to proclaim You,
a conversation pleasing to You,
patience to wait for You

and perseverance to look for You.
Grant me a perfect end –
Your holy Presence.
Grant me a blessed resurrection
and Your recompense –
everlasting life. Amen

If you are reading this on Saturday (11th July) you could not have a better day to starts praying these wonderful words for this is the feast of St Benedict.

Benedict was born in Nursia, in Umbria, and studied in Rome; but he was unable to stomach the dissolute life of the city and became a solitary hermit at Subiaco. His reputation spread, and some monks asked him to be their abbot; but they did not like the discipline he imposed and tried to poison him.

Benedict organised various small communities of monks and nuns in various places, including the great monastery of Monte Cassino. He drew up a set of rules to guide the communal life of monasteries. Although this was not the first monastic rule ever, the Rule of St Benedict has proved so wise and balanced that it has served as the foundation of practically every attempt at communal living ever since – and not only in religious communities. The Rule of St Benedict recognises that people aim at perfection but often fall well short of it, and aims to be a "rule for beginners" in which even the least perfect and least able can grow in spiritual stature. To visit a Benedictine monastery of almost any kind is to find oneself spending time among a group of people who, by their strivings to live and grow together, have become more and more themselves, as God intended them, instead of being crushed into false uniformity by some idealistic and authoritarian regime.

For those of us in the world, too, the Rule of St Benedict has much to say: it drags our eyes up to the stars but keeps our feet firmly on the ground; it calls us to perfection but keeps us sane.

CHANGING OUR LIVES:

Should we take on board the prayer Of St. Benedict, we will certainly change internally and mentally grow closer to Christ but these mental changes must be put into practice and demonstrated in the way we actually live our lives and so become a lifelong personal mission.

This is easily achieved by joining one of the many Catholic social action groups and so work with likeminded people. You could subscribe to one of the following and receive their literature on a regular basis or get into the habit of visiting their web site(s) on a weekly or fortnightly basis.

These are but a few of the many charities that we could be taking an interest in and supporting; not just financially but, more importantly with our prayers. Here are a few lines where you can add the names of charities which focus on some aspect(s) of the Beatitudes:

PARISH FINANCES:

Despite the enforced lockdown and physical closure of our church buildings, we still have to keep the finances going in order to pay the bills. This is made more difficult because part of the weekly offertory (contributions via the plate, or by the envelope system) are struggling to reach us.

As the churches begin to open and services resume, those able to attend will notice that at Mass, there will be no Offertory Collection. Those attending will, however, be able to place their donation in a basket as they enter or leave church.

There is an alternative which makes things easier for all (including the Counters and those actually go to the bank): it allows parishioners who use digital/ online banking and which ensures that your offertory reaches us in due time.

It is quite easy for such parishioners to set up, through their own bank, a Standing Order in favour of the Church to ensure your offertory can still be received despite the lockdown or restricted access.

You can do this through your own phone or computer by you using the bank's own system to set up a Standing Order.

The details you need are:

- 1. <u>the Recipient</u> "Chapel en le Frith Catholic Church NRCDT"; or "St Mary & The Annunciation Parish NRCDT"
- 2. the amount which you can enter yourself; weekly or monthly; and
- 3. you need to put **your name** in the "reference" section so we can identify your payment.

The only other information you need is the parish **Sort Code** and **Account number**.
